Economic prosperity and growth is dependent on an adequate and steady supply of many minerals, whether for construction, electricity generation, manufacturing or new emerging technologies. The European Union in 2010 announced that there were 14 critical raw materials needed for current emerging technologies such as mobile phone, optic cable and wireless networks.
